A THESIS STATEMENT IS...

- 1. your paper in a nutshell. It tells the reader what main idea you are going to develop. It also serves as a tool to help define, focus, and nail down exactly about what you want to write.
- 2. always a complete sentences.
- 3. never a question.
- 4. never an exclamation.
- 5. never merely a statement of intent. For example, "In this paper I..."
- 6. never an obvious statement which most people already know or with which they agrees. For example, "Walter Cronkite is the anchorman for CBS News," leaves the reader wondering, "So what?"
- 7. your opinion. It reflects your attitude or point of view toward your subject.
- 8. a promise to the reader to develop such-and-such an idea in such-and-such a manner.

TO WRITE A PRECISE THESIS STATEMENT, CONSIDER:

What do I mean by that?
In what way?
How?
What am I getting at?
What do I want to make sure my readers know?
Why is this issue important to readers?
